

PRESIDENT'S REPORT



I am delighted to present the 110th report of the Victorian Olympic Council (VOC) at its Annual General Meeting in 2022.

Whilst 2021 was a busy year with the Tokyo Olympics and the Beijing Winter Olympic Games following in early 2022, Olympic activities in Victoria were stalled due to the States lockdowns.

2021 saw the VOC support ongoing changes to the operations and method of delivery of Australian Olympic Committee (AOC) services to the community and Olympic family. The following strategic objectives of the AOC and State Olympic Councils (SOC) in relation to the management and delivery of programmes and services and the furthering of Olympism in Victoria were endorsed by the VOC Executive.

The AOC undertakes to:

1. Design and implement programs for community engagement, promotion of Olympism, support of Olympians during and post athletic careers and any other program to further the objectives of the AOC;
2. Manage and fund these programs centrally, with local delivery;
3. Seek commercial partners to enable further development and program support;
4. Consult with the SOC during the development of programs and provide regular reports on progress and delivery;
5. To work with the SOC on strategies specific to that SOC territory;
6. Consult with the SOC on Team Appeal planning;
7. Collaborate with the SOC in the advocacy of the Olympic movement in the SOC territory particularly with governments and their departments and Institutes of Sport;
8. Provide administrative support to SOC Executive and committees;
9. Provide corporate services to SOC to support its operation and regulatory compliance; and

10. AOC representative will report to the SOC Executive on activities in each State at meetings of the SOC Executive. The SOC Executive will give the AOC reasonable notice of when meetings are to be held.

Despite that and to assist the AOC streamline the Olympic approach throughout the country the Olympic bodies in Victoria will be re-structured to better reflect their responsibilities with their own strategic deliverables and Committees.

Going forward we will be known as the Victorian Olympic Advisory Committee with Chair Mark Turnbull, the Australian Olympians Association Victoria with Delegates David Culbert and Linley Frame taking the lead and I will Chair the Julius Patching Foundation.

As you recall during the 2020 period of this report, the Prime Minister's Olympic Dinner (PMOD) Executive were well on track to reach the \$2.5m target for the 2020 Australian Olympic Team, with more than 80% of tables sold at the end of the year.

Due to the events that occurred in the first quarter of 2020, AOC Chief Executive Officer, Matt Carroll AM, in discussions with all Team Appeal Committees decided to cancel all our major fundraisers for the Tokyo 2020 Australian Olympic Team, this included the Prime Minister's 10th Olympic Dinner that was scheduled for Saturday 27 June 2020.

We had resumed plans for the dinner in 2021, but in the end, took the unfortunate decision to cancel the event due to the ongoing COVID restrictions.

I personally thank PMOD Chair, Peter Fox AM for his leadership and guidance. We are extremely grateful for the PMOD Executive and invaluable support over the past 4 years, please refer to page 3 for a list of the Executive members.

The Julius Patching Foundation (JPF) continues to mature and in 2022 we will present the John Landy Scholarships to 16 Olympians. The list of recipients can be found on page 10. I thank Peter Halstead, Kieren Perkins OAM and James Tomkins OAM for their outstanding guidance and work on the

investment portfolio through the JPF Sub-Committee.

I thank Australian Olympians Association President, Leon Wiegard OAM and the Australian Olympians Association Victoria for their ongoing support and look forward to the annual Olympic event in November 2022 after missing the opportunity in 2021 to re connect with the important Olympic community in Victoria.

I would like to acknowledge the Australian Olympic Committee for their continued support of the Victorian Olympic Council and our Executive. The Board and I congratulate and thank CEO Matt Carroll AM for his direction over the last 12 months of the AOC.

I also acknowledge the contribution by my fellow Executive members, ensuring our programs continue to uphold a high calibre while connecting the Victorian community to the Olympic Movement.

I would particularly thank Warwick Waters and Lisa Lilleyman for their work to ensure we service the significant Victorian Olympic community and promote the Olympic ideals in this State.

Special thanks to our constituent and recognised sporting bodies; who play a key role in developing the Victorian sport landscape from grass roots level and up; to our stakeholders, volunteers as well as our Victorian Olympians and Officials for their passion and commitment to the programs delivered throughout the Olympiad and to the Olympic Movement in Victoria.

Sadly, it is with some sadness but absolute gratification that we thank and salute the one and only Leon Wiegard as he steps down from his many roles across the Olympic family. Words do not do justice to the gigantic contribution he has made. Suffice to say, he has served the Olympic Movement with extraordinary dedication and passion, and all the while maintaining an athlete first mentality with a unique sense of humour. A true Olympic Legend.

I am now handing the Presidency baton to Mark Turnbull. It has been an absolute honour and a privilege to serve the Olympic movement in Victoria and I thank all who have helped me along the way. I look forward to seeing the Olympic name continue to shine brightly in our state as it so deserves.

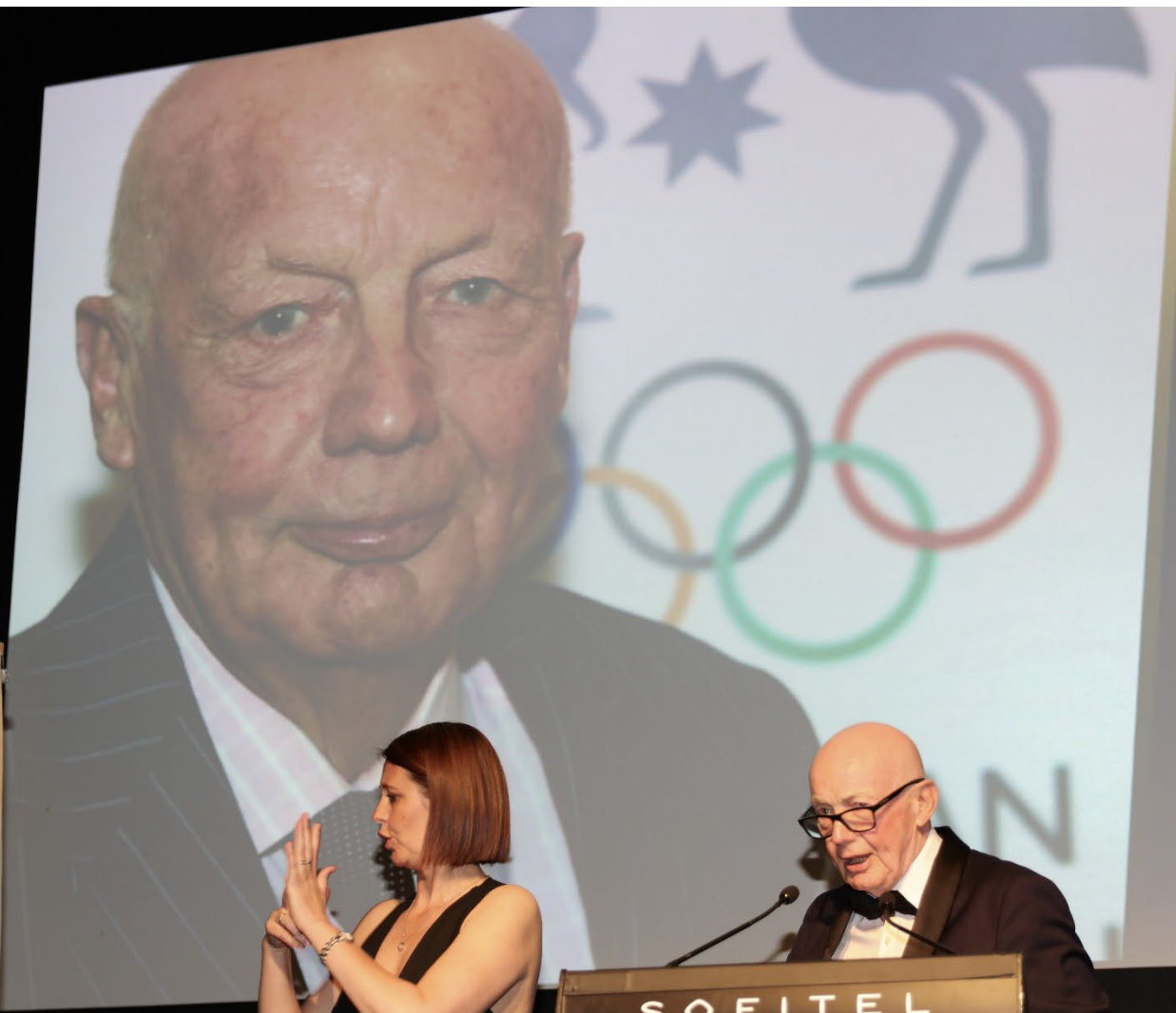

WILFRID KENT HUGHES AWARD

Sir Wilfrid Kent Hughes, KGE, MVO, DSC, MC, ED, 1885-1970, will be remembered as Chairman of the Melbourne 1956 Olympic Games Organising Committee, for his great love of sport and for his contribution to the Victorian and Australian Olympic Movement. He was without doubt a great Australian, a soldier, an Olympian, a leader and a true administrator.

To perpetuate his outstanding contribution, the Victorian Olympic Council selects the most outstanding performance by a Victorian Olympian at each Olympic Games to receive this award.

A perpetual plaque is etched with the recipient's name and a replica plaque is awarded to the recipient.

JULIUS PATCHING SPORTS OFFICIAL OF THE YEAR AWARD

This award is in recognition of the unprecedented and tireless contribution of Julius Patching to the Victorian Olympic Council and the Olympic community. Judy was a voluntary official from 1947 until his death in 2009.

This award recognises the outstanding contribution that officials make to the fabric of the Olympic sporting community in Victoria. One nomination per State Sporting Association is accepted for consideration each year.

The award is presented annually at the Annual General Meeting by Colin and Bruce, sons of the late Judy Patching. In 2020, given sport in Victoria was largely not possible for a lot of sports, the Julius Patching Sports Official of the Year Award nominations were not called for. JOHN LANDY SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

AUSTRALIAN OLYMPIC CHANGE-MAKER



The Australian Olympic Change-Maker (OCM) program recognises students who are demonstrating the Olympic spirit - friendship, sportsmanship and striving for excellence – both on and off the playing field, through leadership and driving positive change in their school or local community.

The program is open to all Australian secondary schools and in its third year it attracted over 900 nominations from across the country. The program is considered a key AOC initiative as a platform to consistently connect and engage with young people to influence the entire community to experience the lifelong benefits of sport.

This year 204 nominations were received from Victorian schools, 26 Year 10's, 54 Year 11's and 124 Year 12 students. Of the 204, 82 were male and 122 were female. In total, nationally, 909 leaders who drove change in their school or local community were recognised.

AUSTRALIAN OLYMPIC CHANGE-MAKER NATIONAL VIRTUAL FORUM

On 31 August, the 2021 OCM National Virtual Forum celebrated change-makers across the country with returning athletes from the Tokyo Olympic Games, including: Olympians, Izaak Stubblety-Cook (swimming gold medallist); Taliqua Clancy (beach volleyball silver medallist); Mariafe Artacho del Solar (beach volleyball silver medallist); and Kyle Vander-Kuyp (AOC Reconciliation Action Plan Ambassador & Tokyo Athlete support officer). Hosted by Olympian Brooke Hanson, the forum focused on the three values of Olympism - Excellence, Friendship and Respect.

2021 AUSTRALIAN OLYMPIC CHANGE-MAKER NATIONAL SUMMIT

Twenty-four (24) Change-Makers were selected by an Olympian panel to attend the 2021 OCM National Summit based on a 1-minute video submission. The videos demonstrated the Olympic spirit of friendship, sportsmanship and striving for excellence, both on and off the playing field, through leadership and driving positive change in their school or local communities.

The 24 selected Change-Makers participated in a two-day summit on 6 and 10 December.

The key focus was to provide a platform for these Change-Makers to share their innovative ideas for the 2022 Have A Go campaign aimed to get all Australians to participate in Olympic sports.

The Change-Makers were supported by Olympians and focussed on a specific theme identified as important by the 2021 cohort:

- Sam Fricker (diving) - benefits of health
- Mellissa Tapper (table tennis) - equality and diversity
- Izaak Stubblety-Cook (swimming) - regional and remote
- Jemima Montag (athletics) - youth empowerment

The AOC would like to thank The Royal Australian Mint who supported the National Summit and provided custom medallions for each participant.

The Australian Olympic Connect | ともだち 2021 program connects students and teachers internationally to celebrate the Olympic movement while sharing a unique insight into each country's customs, lifestyle and activities in the lead up to the Olympic Games.

The program, ともだち 2021, or tomodachi 2021 - meaning friends in English, signifies that the foundation of the program is built on friendship and creating an international connection through our youth that goes on well past the end of the Games.

The Olympic movement unites countries and their peoples. The AOC was proud to connect 307 school classes here in Australia to 307 school classes in Japan, impacting nearly 20,000 students (based on 30 students per class) aged between 10-16 years of age.

In Victoria, 48 schools were matched with similar aged classes in Japan. The class-to-class relationships were driven by the language teachers in the schools.



The classes were matched by the AOC according to their age/year level, existing relationships and communication capability. Language Teachers were introduced, and contact details shared.

A bilingual communication guide was provided, with suggested themes and focal points to assist in meaningful collaboration and relationship building. Teachers were encouraged to have regular communication from program commencement (6 May, 2021) until the conclusion of the program (23 July, 2021).

The overwhelming success of the program stemmed from the high level of support received from our stakeholders. The program had the support of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Japan, the Australian Embassy in Japan and the Japanese Embassy in Australia.

Relationships with the Monash University and their Japanese Language Teachers Association Network, the Council of Local Authority for International Relations (CLAIR) in Japan and Australia and the JTB Corporation in Australia were critical to the widespread communication and promotion of the program, encouraging schools in Japan to register.

The program enabled an avenue for the AOC to engage with youth in Australia and the Olympic Games host country to connect through sport and promote the fundamental principles and values of Olympism.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 December 2021

(1) CORPORATE INFORMATION

The financial report of the Victorian Olympic Council Inc. ('VOC' or 'Council') for the year ended 31 December 2021 was authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the Executive on 10 February 2022.

The VOC is an Association incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Reform Act, 2012 of Victoria and is domiciled in Victoria.

The Directors of the Julius Patching Foundation Limited comprises those persons being voting members of the Executive of the VOC.

The principal place of business is Level 2, O'Brien Group Arena, 105 Pearl River Road, Docklands, Victoria 3008.

The nature of the operations and principal activities of the Council are that it acts to develop and protect the Olympic movement in the state of Victoria in accordance with the Olympic Charter and the Constitution of the Australian Olympic Committee Inc.

(2) STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are:

(a) Basis of preparation

This special purpose financial report has been prepared for distribution to the members of the council to fulfil the Executive's financial reporting requirements under the Associations Incorporation Reform Act, 2012 of Victoria and the Council's Constitution. The accounting policies used in the preparation of this financial report, as described below, are consistent with the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform Act, 2012 of Victoria and the Council's Constitution, and are, in the opinion of the Executive, appropriate to meet the needs of members:

- (i) The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis of accounting including the historical cost convention and the going concern assumption.
- (ii) The Council is not a reporting entity because in the opinion of the Executive there are unlikely to exist users of the financial report who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs.

The members neither hold equity in, nor are financial lenders to the Council and their membership is pursuant to the Olympic Charter as well as the Constitution.

Accordingly, the financial report has been prepared in accordance with the Associations Incorporation Reform Act, 2012 of Victoria and the Constitution, the basis of accounting specified by all Accounting Standards and Interpretations and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements', AASB 107 'Cash Flow Statements', AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors', AASB 1031 'Materiality' and AASB 1048 'Interpretation and Application of Standards' which apply to all entities required to prepare financial reports under the Associations Incorporation Reform Act, 2012 of Victoria.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 December 2021

(a) Basis of preparation (continued)

The Executive has determined that in order for the financial report to give a true and fair view of the Council's performance, cash flows and financial position, the requirements of Australian Accounting Standards and other financial reporting requirements in Australia relating to the measurement of assets, liabilities, revenues, expenses and equity should be complied with.

(iii) The financial report is prepared in Australian dollars.

(b) Income and expenditure recognition

Income, with the exception of fundraising, has been brought to account on an accrual basis and if not received at balance date is reflected in the statement of financial position as a receivable. Income received at balance date that is in relation to future years is brought to account as unearned income. Expenses have been brought to account as incurred and any expenses incurred but not paid for at balance date are reflected in the Statement of Financial Position as creditors.

(c) Government grants

Government grants are recognised at their fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received, and all attaching conditions have been complied with.

(d) Income Tax

The VOC is exempt from Australian income tax.

(e) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and short-term deposits in the Statement of Financial Position comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purpose of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cash equivalents as defined above.

(f) Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables, which generally have 30 – 90 day terms, are recognised and carried at original invoice amount less an allowance for any uncollectable amounts. An estimate for doubtful debts is made when collection of the full amount is no longer probable. Bad debts are written off when identified.

(g) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and short-term deposits in the Statement of Financial Position comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purpose of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cash equivalents as defined above.

(h) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and short-term deposits in the Statement of Financial Position comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less, and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purpose of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cash equivalents as defined above.

(i) Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables, which generally have 30 – 90 day terms, are recognised and carried at original invoice amount less an allowance for any uncollectable amounts.

An estimate for doubtful debts is made when collection of the full amount is no longer probable. Bad debts are written off when identified.

(j) Plant and equipment

Acquisition

Items of plant and equipment are recorded at cost or, in the case of donations and sponsorship contributions in kind, at fair value at the time of donation or contribution, less accumulated depreciation and any impairment in value.

Depreciation and amortisation

Items of plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight line method over their estimated useful lives ranging from 3 to 10 years from the date of acquisition.

Impairment

The carrying values of plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

If any such indication exists and where the carrying values exceed the estimated recoverable amount, the assets are written down to their recoverable amount.

The recoverable amount of plant and equipment is the greater of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. Value in use is the depreciated replacement cost of an asset when the future economic benefits of the asset are not primarily dependent on the asset's ability to generate net cash inflows and where the Council would, if deprived of the asset, replace its remaining future economic benefits.

Impairment losses would be recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

(k) Trade and other payables

Expenditure is brought to account on an accruals basis. Any expenses incurred but not paid for at balance date are recorded as payables on the Statement of Financial Position.

(l) Interest

'Interest paid' and 'Interest received' are usually classified as operating cash flows. Interest is recorded when received and used in the general operations of the Victorian Olympic Council.

(m) Interest bearing loans and borrowings

All loans and borrowings are initially recognised at cost, being the fair value of the consideration received net of issue costs associated with the borrowing.

After initial recognition, interest bearing loans and borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any issue costs and any discount or premium on settlement.

Gains or losses are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income when the liabilities are derecognised and as well as through the amortisation process.

Loans and borrowings are classified as current liabilities, unless the Council has unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability, where maturity is less than 12 months.

(n) Employee benefits and expenses

VOC has no employees.

(3) SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS, ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS

In applying the accounting policies, the VOC, evaluates judgements, estimates and assumptions based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events. All judgements, estimates and assumptions made are believed to be reasonable based on the most current set of circumstances available to the VOC. Actual results may differ from the judgements, estimates and assumptions. Significant judgements, estimates and assumptions made by the Council in the preparation of these financial statements are outlined below:


