Ian Chesterman AM B.Comm

Ian Chesterman AM has served as President of the Australian Olympic Committee (**AOC**) since being elected in 2022, is also an IOC Member, Vice President of the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Organising Committee and an Executive Member of ONOC. Ian was first elected to the AOC Executive in 2001 and became Vice President in 2016. He was the Chef de Mission at six Winter Games – 1998, 2002, 2006, 2010, 2014 and 2018. Ian was also Chef de Mission of the Australian Team to Tokyo 2020, becoming the first Australia to head both a summer and winter Olympic Team, and the first to lead a total of seven Australian Olympic Teams. Ian is a Life Member of the AOC and was made a Member of the Order of Australia in 2019.

Matt has been a member of the AOC Executive since 2017 and Vice President since 2022. Chair of the AOC Finance Commission and member of the AOF Investment Advisory Committee since 2017. Member of the AOC & AOF Audit Committees, Australian Olympic Indigenous Athlete Scholarship Committee and IF Engagement Committee. Former President and CEO of UBS Japan and Regional Treasurer of UBS Asia Pacific. Former Managing Director of Swiss Bank Corporation. President of Australian Sailing, 2013-19; Vice President 2011-13. Architect of the “One Management” Structure for National Sport Federations. Since 2020 Matt has been a World Sailing Council member and Chair of the Oceanic and Offshore Committee. Chair of the Offshore Advisory Committee for World Sailing. Four-time overall winner of the Sydney Hobart Yacht Race. Former World Champion 11 Metre Class. Four-time Kings Cup Winner. Five-time winner of Ocean Racing Yachts Person of the Year award. Former member of Equestrian Australia Board Nomination Committee. Trustee for the John Harrison Olympic Foundation Member of the Arbitration Tribunal for the 35th Americas Cup.

Evelyn Halls OAM OLY, B.A., LL.B (Hons)

Evelyn has been a member of the AOC Executive since 2017 and Vice President since 2022. Evelyn is a two time Olympian (Sydney 2000, Athens 2004) and competed at an elite level for over 30 years. She served as Chef de Mission of the Australian Team for the Youth Olympic Games in 2018 and as Deputy Chef de Mission for the Tokyo Olympics. Evelyn chairs the AOC Governance Committee and is a member of the Audit and Risk Committees, the Finance Commission and the Culture Remuneration & Nominations Committee. Layne Beachley AO

Layne Beachley AO is a true surfing legend. 19 years on the pro tour, she dominated with a remarkable 7 world titles- an unmatched 6 of them in a row. While competing, she spent 15 years shaping the sport as a director on the ASP board. She staged the richest surfing in the world from 2006-2013, doubled tour prizemoney, and invested over \$1M in young women's futures through her Aim for The Stars Foundation. Her impact extended to 5 years on the SAHOF board and 15 years with Surfing Australia, including 8 years as Chair. A Sport Australia Hall of Fame Legend, Patron of Surfing Australia and ambassador for Black Dog Institute and Gotcha4Life, today Layne is a champion for mental wellness as a keynote speaker and co-founder of Awake Academy, inspiring people to live happier and more purposeful lives. A director at UrbnSurf, she surfs daily and mentors young female surfers.

Kitty has also had an accomplished career within the broader Australian sport sector - as an NF President (Modern Pentathlon) and CEO (Gymnastics). Kitty retains trusted networks within National Federations and remains a strong and pragmatic advocate for keeping sport, federations and athletes front of mind in all decision making. At the international level, Kitty has been President of two Oceania Confederations (MP and Gymnastics); she sat on the FIG (Gymnastics) IF Executive for 5 years and in 2024 was elected as the first ever female Vice President of the International Modern Pentathlon Federation. For the last quad Kitty has chaired the AOC IF Engagement Committee. Kitty's passionate and values-based leadership expertise and experiences, coupled with her unique array of Games and broader sector roles (including at the ASC and now the NST), see her continue to add value to the Australian sport sector and the Olympic movement.

As an athlete, Michael competed in both the 1992 and 1996 Olympics and won two gold medals in the 1994 Commonwealth Games. He was a four-time World Junior Champion – twice in diving (1991) and twice in trampolining (1984). He is a Partner at Bain Capital where he leads the Australian private equity business. Bain Capital is one of the world's leading investment firms with A\$290B of assets under management. Michael led the acquisition of Virgin Australia in 2020 and the privatisation of Estia Health in 2023. He has been a private equity investor since 2008 and was a management consultant with Bain & Company from 2002 – 2008. Michael received his MBA from Harvard Business School, and a Bachelor of Laws (Hons) & Bachelor of Commerce from Bond University.

Susie O'Neill AM

A three-time Olympian and eight-time medallist, including two golds, I have extensive experience in leadership, media, and athlete advocacy. Passionate about the Olympic movement, I am eager to contribute to its future. I served as an IOC Member (2000–2005) after being elected as an athlete representative and later took on key leadership roles, including Australian Chef de Mission at the 2014 Youth Olympics and Deputy Chef de Mission at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics. Since 2021, I have also been an ambassador for the Fred Hollows Foundation. Beyond sport, I have built a strong media career, working as an Olympic commentator for Beijing 2008 and London 2012 and as a radio host with Nova Entertainment (2013–present), including co-hosting the Nova Breakfast Show (2013–2024). Married to Cliff Fairley with two adult children, I remain deeply committed to the Olympic movement and keen to make a valuable impact.

Elizabeth Scott (Weekes) OAM OLY BSpSc A.I.C.D

Liz was a member of the gold medal winning Sydney 2000 water polo team. Liz is best known for playing a vital role in campaigning and securing the inclusion of women's water polo in the Olympics leaving a lasting legacy. Liz enjoyed an impressive international playing career with her team from 1995-2001 winning a number of World Cup and world championship medals. Liz is very experienced in the world of high performance sport. For the past two decades she has been actively involved in coaching, managing and mentoring both grass roots and elite teams from rowing and water polo, in NSW, WA and internationally. Elected to the AOC executive in 2022. Liz is a member of the AOC CRN Committee, the Legacy and Impact committee as well as was on the Paris 2024 Selection Committee. Currently Liz dedicates her time to philanthropy in Sport, co-chairing the WA Olympic Team appeal committee, involved in the WA parliamentary friendship group and is a founding member of the Australian Water polo foundation.

Sandra Sully AM

One of Australia's most trusted journalists and news presenters, Sandra Sully has been delivering news and sport into the homes of Australians for more than three decades. From 2013-23, Sandra was Vice-President and Director on the Board of Hockey Australia. During this time, Sandra helped secure millions of dollars of partnerships and responsibilities included developing strategies to grow the sport at every level – from grassroots participation to Australia's elite high-performance program for the Hockeyroos and Kookaburras.
